
- SAU students attended the FBLA Collegiate State Leadership Conference in Little Rock, AR. They won 24 awards, more than any other FBLA-Collegiate chapter in the state. Of the 31 SAU students who competed, 19 won awards and are eligible to represent Arkansas at the FBLA-Collegiate National Leadership Conference in Atlanta, GA, in June.



- RCB hosted the second annual SOAR Sustainability Conference in April. Keynote speaker Hallie Shoffner, a sixth-generation row crop farmer in Jackson County, AR, spoke about the effects of climate change on food supply and steps citizens can take to help.
- Under the supervision of NaTashia Riley, SAU's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program (VITA) students assisted over 120 community members with filing their taxes for free. Not only did SAU students save community members hundreds of dollars in fees, but they helped them secure \$121,525 in tax refunds.

College of Science and Engineering

- Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approved the stand-alone degree for mechanical engineering. Dr. David Lanoue said, "Our industry partners in engineering have urged us to offer a pure mechanical engineering program because they are in desperate need of mechanical engineers."



- The Cinda Hallman scholarship was awarded to four incoming freshmen women in the college of science and engineering: Sophy Tyson of Hope, AR; Emily Leyden of Lewisville, TX; Julia DeSalvo of Center Ridge, AR; and Kelli Minge of Cabot, AR.



- The NORCO SAU Dean E.E. Graham scholarship was awarded to incoming engineering major freshman Carston Poole of Prescott, AR. Along with studying engineering, Poole has committed to joining the Mulerider baseball team. The scholarship is funded through the Edna Cook Norvell estate to honor the memory of Dean E.E. Graham.

- Nursing major Ashlei Johnson received the Joey Baker-Emerson, Arkansas Scholarship. Johnson aims to further her education post-graduation by enrolling in a masters of nursing program. She hopes to work on the medical-surgical floor of a hospital as well as pursue travel nursing.



- Arkansas Space Grant Consortium board voted to fund Dr. Gija Geme, Dr. Tim Schroeder and Dr. Copie Moore on a joint venture to explore the feasibility of growing crops in a Mars soil simulant. The team received NASA funding of \$50,000 to measure heavy metal uptake by plants using Inductively Coupled Plasma (ICP) Spectroscopy analysis.

Dr. John R. Jones has been appointed to serve as Dean of the College of Education and Human Performance, effective July 1, 2023.

A seasoned academic administrator, Dr. Jones has held many positions in higher education. Most recently, he was professor and Director of Master of Arts in Teaching at Southern Nazarene University. He has served as Dean of the College of Education at the University of Arkansas, Fort Smith, and as a Clinical Professor of Educational Leadership and Program Area Coordinator at the University of Oklahoma. From 1999-2004, Dr. Jones supported Muleriders as Professor and Dean of Graduate Studies at SAU.

“I am super excited to return to SAU because the people are great to work with. Out of the six universities where I’ve

been employed, SAU is the best place I have ever worked,” said Jones.

Dr. Jones has published numerous articles on effective leadership, teacher evaluation, and students’ assessment of teacher quality. In 2020 Dr. Jones and his student assistant Misty Henry published *Redefining Instructional Leadership: The Skills and Energy Required of an Instructional Leader*, a book which argues that successful leaders’ first responsibility is to build relationships with their staff.

Dr. Jones is eager to bring faculty together to advance the University’s mission.

Dr. Jones holds a B.S. in Music Education from East Central University, an M.M.Ed. in Music Education from the University of Oklahoma, and an Ed.D. in Educational Leadership from Oklahoma State University.

Dr. Jennifer Rowsam '03, '06 has been named Dean of the Dempsey College of Liberal and Performing Arts, effective July 1, 2023.

As Associate Provost for Institutional Effectiveness and Strategic Planning, Dr. Rowsam has coordinated continuous quality improvement, accreditation, assessment, program review, strategic planning, and registration processes at the University. She played a key role in the reaccreditation of SAU’s Social Work, Nursing, and Teacher Education programs. Dr. Rowsam has provided oversight for institutional research, concurrent education, professional advising in the academic colleges, and the University’s stop-out program. She has also assisted with compliance, catalog revisions, and retention/completion initiatives.

As an Assistant Professor of Psychology, Dr. Rowsam

has a reputation for being a highly effective and popular teacher, frequently bringing her students into the research process. She is also a certified Quality Matters peer reviewer.

Dr. Tim Schroeder - Faculty

Associate Professor and Department Chair - Department of Biochemistry and Chemistry

Tim Schroeder earned his PhD in analytical chemistry in 1999 and began his career at SAU in 2000 as the Director of Institutional Research while also teaching chemistry lecture courses as an adjunct instructor.

In 2003, Dr. Schroeder was hired as a faculty member in the Department of Biochemistry and Chemistry where he currently serves as associate professor and department chair. At SAU, he has taught a variety of chemistry courses. Students strongly desire the instructional experience provided by his classroom. His ability to effectively teach analytical, organic, and other chemistry courses is well-respected by students, faculty, and area medical and industrial employers.

Dr. Schroeder's campus impact is also evident in the science facilities at SAU. His work with the administration,

architects, and contractors was critical in the construction of the Science Center and the Natural Resources Research Center (NRRC). He served as the first NRRC director from 2010-2012 and has continued to serve as Senior Analyst since 2012, working with the director to train undergraduate researchers on all aspects of instrumentation at the facility.

Beyond the classroom and laboratory, Dr. Schroeder has served the campus community in many ways. He has been elected to the Faculty Senate for 12 years, including two terms as its president. He has been the faculty advisor for the Chemistry Club for many years, organizing overnight trips and activities to help chemistry majors form lasting relationships. He has also delivered memorable moments for campus visitors through his fun and exciting chemistry demonstration shows.

Restaurateur (Retired) and SAU Physical Plant

Carmen "Corky" Fantini is a man of many talents, but slowing down hasn't been one of them.

Born and raised in Tyler, Texas, Fantini moved to Plano when he was young. He worked under Ross Perot, Sr., at Electronic Data Systems for 10 years before taking a sales manager position at The Graphics Group. After another decade in the booming Dallas area, Fantini and his family agreed that they were ready for a change of pace.

They moved to Magnolia, AR.

With experience in the restaurant business, Fantini bought Miller's Cafeteria. Located on North Vine Street, Miller's had become an institution, and Fantini viewed ownership as a "semi-retirement plan." Eighteen years later, Fantini announced his retirement when he sold the restaurant in 2011.

Six weeks later, however, Fantini began working for Southern Arkansas University.

"I just couldn't sit," he said, and SAU was better for it.

Aramark hired Fantini before transitioning to the physical plant, where he maintained 90 acres of lawn for over a decade.

"It was a lot of work, but it's instant gratification," Fantini said of managing the grounds. "You can see the difference you've made immediately."

"SAU offers wonderful things. It's home to a lot of the kids," he said. And he would know; Fantini's children, Mandy and James, attended SAU.

Whether or not Corky Fantini can sit still has yet to be seen. As of June 2023, Fantini has retired from SAU and lives with his wife, Nancy, in Magnolia. They have four grandchildren.

Muleriders go GLOBAL

SAU Business Students Travel Abroad

Southern Arkansas University business students traveled the world in May 2023 for immersive learning experiences in Kenya and Italy. Muleriders visited a variety of businesses and culturally significant sites, gaining a global perspective that will serve them beyond graduation.

In Italy, students were introduced to multiple family-owned businesses, such as a sheep farm, an organic farm, wineries, and a multi-generational stonework business. Perhaps the most impactful family-owned business SAU students encountered was the Castello delle Serre, a Tuscan castle turned bed and breakfast, located in Serre di Rapolano. Its proprietors, the Gangale family, which includes SAU MBA alumna Kaci Matthews '10, '12, hosted the Muleriders for seven days.

"I learned the art of asking questions in international business," said Heath Heikes, senior accounting major from Pottsville, AR. "I want to thank our guides Kaci, Salvatore, and Antonio, who have honed in on helping us students to ask the right questions."

When they weren't walking the Roman Road, exploring the Colosseum, or climbing the steps of the oldest bank in the world, the Muleriders attended a medieval festival, stopped by the Italian Stock Exchange, and enjoyed the sulfuric thermal spas.

Over 5,000 miles away, in Kenya, SAU business students maintained an equally busy schedule. They toured the Mbumi Coffee Estates, took game drives through the Masai Mara National Reserve and Amboseli National Park, visited a traditional Masai village, and hiked around Mount Longonot.

At Nyumbani Children's Home, a nonprofit providing life-saving medical care, nutrition, education, and shelter to over 100 HIV-positive children, Muleriders learned about the organization's history and met some of the children who live there.

The final day included touring two bead-making factories in Nairobi and exploring an open Masai market, where students put their negotiation skills to the test. This was a great experience for the faculty and students alike and a great opportunity to compare various market structures and exchange.

Dr. Stephen Juma, assistant professor of marketing, said, "Trips like this are important for SAU business students to apply the skills they've learned in the classroom to real-world needs."

Thanks to the generous support of SAU alumni, students like Bryant, Arkansas, native and senior Hannah Henderson were able to leave the United States for the first time:

"I experienced many firsts that I would not have been able to do on my own. I saw the ocean for the first time while walking on one of the whitest sand beaches in the world in Diani."


Traveling internationally certainly left an impression on SAU Muleriders, but Muleriders left an impression as well. Her students responded with enthusiasm from London to Italy.

In Loving Memory of Dr. Claude "Buddy"



It is with great sadness that we share the passing of Dr. Claude "Buddy" Baker, retired faculty and Department of Biology Chair. Dr. Baker was a passionate educator, researcher, and his contributions to SAU will always be remembered.

It's rare to find someone with the ability to seamlessly blend a career and personal passions with service, but Dr. Baker did it beautifully. Everything he did was with a heart of service beating behind it.

His excitement in teaching and his heart of service was contagious. Students responded and learned, and that is why he was recognized by students as Advisor of the Year in 2012. Baker learned by the example of his parents, who devoted their lives in volunteer service to their south Arkansas community. For him, giving back came as naturally as breathing.

Before coming to SAU, Dr. Baker was a professor at Indiana University where he was awarded both the distinguished teaching and distinguished research awards. He also received the all-university teaching award over all professors on the eight Indiana University campuses. In 2006, Baker received the Presidents Volunteer Service lifetime award for his over 5,000 hours of

volunteer service.

He was a lifetime member of the Alumni Association and was a member of the SAU Foundation Board of Governors. He was a member of First Baptist Church, Magnolia, and a member of the Columbia County Republican Committee, serving on the state committee.

Dr. Baker helped establish three endowed scholarships: Claude D. Baker -- Call to Service by Steve Moberly at IUS, William and Dorothy Craig Music Endowment, and the Claude and Skeet Baker Endowed Scholarship in marine biology at SAU.

To honor his legacy, we have established the Dr. Claude Baker Award to fund undergraduate research and education in the field that he loved the most. A FEW OF THE RECENT ATHLETIC ACHIEVEMENTS AND CHANGES AT SAU

Academic Successes

During the 2022-23 academic year, the Muleriders took care of business in the classroom. The department's 419 student-athletes produced a collective all-sports GPA of 3.16 with 67% (228) of those individuals recording a 3.0 GPA or higher. The average pass/fail rate among all sports was 97% and ten of the 16 sports held a team GPA of 3.0 or better. The top three team GPAs for the 2022-23 season belonged to Mulerider Women's Tennis (3.72), Mulerider Softball (3.66) and Mulerider Volleyball (3.59).

Mulerider Men's Golf

Third-year head coach Neriah Brown's Mulerider Men's Golf squad put together a historic campaign in 2022-23. Through mid-March, SAU had logged just one top five finish: a third-place showing at its own Arkansas Collegiate on October 10-11. But it's all about how you finish. Brown's squad scorched a plethora of in-region foes at the DBU Men's Classic (4th of 14; 1st of 7 in-region), the Natural State Classic (2nd of 10), a program-best finish at the GAC Championship (2nd of 9) and a program-best finish at the NCAA DII Central/Midwest Regional (T5 of 20; T2 of 10 in-region). SAU entered the final round of play at the regional tournament six shots back of the advancement line and proceeded to equal its round two performance with a 291 over its final 18 holes to force a three-team playoff with league foes Henderson State and Harding for the final two berths into the national tournament. SAU posted a two-under in the

sudden death playoff to punch the program's first-ever ticket to the NCAA DII National Championship. Caleb Miller, Logan McDonald, Connor Harrington, Luke Cote and Brendan Little became the program's first to tee off in the national championship. The Muleriders produced one all-region selection, three all-league performers including a first team selection and one distinguished scholar-athlete.

SAU Baseball

It was another successful season for Mulerider Baseball. The Muleriders concluded the 2023 campaign at 40-18; the 13th 40-win season in the program's NCAA history. Southern Arkansas won its seventh regular season Great American

Conference Championship (24-9) and its seventh league tournament title to claim a berth in the NCAA postseason for the 15th time. Seventh-year head coach Justin Pettigrew was named GAC Coach of the Year for the third time in his career and for the second-consecutive season, seven players earned All-GAC honors, five of which were named all-region, three were named the league's best defenders at their positions, and three others garnered GAC Distinguished Scholar Athlete honors.

SAU Softball

The 25th team in the history of the Mulerider Softball program produced yet another memorable campaign under ninth-year head coach Jason

Anderson. SAU finished a single game shy of punching its ticket to a third NCAA DII World Series appearance as the Muleriders finished as NCAA DII Central Region runner-up and Great American Conference runner-up following a 45-15 season with 25 of those wins coming in league play. The 40-win season is the fifth for the Muleriders under Anderson and the program's first since 2019. The Muleriders advanced into the NCAA postseason for the seventh-consecutive season and for the eighth time overall. SAU appeared in its third super regional and first since 2018. The Muleriders saw eight members of the 2023 squad garner all-conference honors, one become an all-region performer and six claim academic honors.

Mulerider Track and Field

Both Mulerider Track and Field programs recorded third-place finishes at the Great American Conference Championships in early May. The SAU Women earned a top three finish for the seventh-consecutive season behind "High Point" champion Kailyn Thomas' 26 points and individual title wins by Kamrin Hooks in the 400M and Irieyanna Wilson in the Shot Put. The Mulerider Women produced 32 point-scoring results with a dozen podium placements. The Mulerider Men also earned its seventh-consecutive top three finish at the league championship as a result of 36 point-scoring finishes which included eight podium placements. Ja'Kamron Zackery totaled 20 points with a trio of top three finishes, while Connor White broke the decathlon record and Carter Cheek posted an NCAA provisional qualifying time in the 110H.

Women's Tennis

One season after winning just five matches, the Mulerider Women's tennis team bounced back in 2023 to win 11 contests and capture a share of the Great American Conference regular season title, its second since the 2018-19 season. Sixth-year head coach Greg Owen's squad won four of its five GAC matches. One player earned a superlative honor from the league, two were named distinguished scholar athletes and four received All-GAC honors, three of which were first team selections with two unanimous honorees.

Mulerider Men's Basketball

Southern Arkansas Men's Basketball is the only Great American Conference team to appear in every championship tournament since the league's first season of 2011-12. That streak improved during the 2022-23 season, but first-year head coach Logan Quinn's Muleriders took their appearance a step further and did something the program had never done: won the whole thing. SAU finished its '23 campaign with the most total wins (22) in the program's NCAA Era, the most conference wins (15) in the same span, the highest regular season finish in its GAC membership despite being picked preseason No. 9 and as the Great American Conference Tournament Champions. The Muleriders earned the program's second NCAA Tournament berth of the past three seasons. A 32-game slate saw

the Muleriders set single season program records in points scored (2,478), field goals made (902), three-pointers made (297) and assists (403). SAU saw two players earn All-GAC honors including a superlative award winner and a first team selection, four named GAC All-Tournament, and two named distinguished scholar athletes.

Muleriders in Magnolia

Regardless of how the season's go for each of SAU's 16 athletic programs, one thing that is for certain is that the Muleriders will be active in the community. The department finished ninth in Helper Helper's Division II Top 25 Community Service rankings for the 2022-23 season. Four women's programs finished inside the top 10 in community service hours for their

respective sports: Mulerider Women's Track & Field (5th), Mulerider Women's Golf (10th), Mulerider Women's Tennis (8th) and Mulerider Softball (6th). For the Mulerider Men, six programs placed inside its respective top ten and were led by Mulerider Men's Track & Field's department-high ranking of fourth. Mulerider Men's Basketball (10th), Mulerider Football (8th), Mulerider Men's Golf (9th), Mulerider Men's Tennis (6th) and Mulerider Baseball (7th) were all among the top programs in community service. In all, the Muleriders, from July 1, 2022 through May 31, 2023, recorded 3,412 hours of community service in and around Southern Arkansas University and the Magnolia Community attending 38 different service opportunities with 96% participation among the department's 419 student-athletes and an economic impact of \$108,509.



SAU hosts the sixth annual Mulespy Awards

Southern Arkansas University and the Mulerider Athletics family once again gathered together to celebrate its student-athletes, coaches and programs as part of the Sixth Annual Mulespy Awards which took place on April 26 inside the W.T. Watson Center.

The show served as a fitting end to another successful year for the Muleriders in competition, in the classroom and in the community. Seventeen outstanding student-athletes, representing each of the program's 16 sports and cheerleading, were honored while 63 senior student-athletes were recognized and given a special wrist watch to commemorate their time as a Mulerider.

Garnering the department's top two athletic honors were Mulerider Baseball senior catcher Brett McGee, who was named the Auburn Smith Male Athlete of the Year, and Mulerider Tennis senior Lena Milosevic, who claimed the Dr. Margaret Downing Female Athlete of the Year award. The player of the year awards are given to the top Male and Female Athlete in a given year at SAU regardless of classification and that possesses conduct that has been a positive influence for good and exemplifies the ideals of Auburn Smith and Dr. Margaret Downing, each an SAU Sports Hall of Famer that left an indelible mark on Mulerider Athletics during their storied tenures at the University.

For their outstanding academic achievement, extracurricular involvement and athletic ability, the Murphy USA Male and Female Scholar-Athlete of the Year awards were presented to Mulerider Men's Cross Country and Track & Field senior Briston Rains and Mulerider Women's Track & Field graduate sprinter Kamrin Hooks. In continual recognition of Murphy USA's strong partnership with Southern Arkansas University and Mulerider Athletics, Murphy USA's Donna Lambis '09, Director of Retail Merchandise Accounting, was on hand to present remarks on behalf of the organization and help present both scholar honors which were first awarded in 2017.

Rains was also honored alongside 24 other student-athletes that made up the third induction class of the SAU Chapter of Chi Alpha Sigma, the first, and only, national scholar-athlete society to honor four-year collegiate student-athletes who have excelled in both the classroom and in athletic competition. The ceremony was conducted by SAU Faculty Athletic Representative Dr. Scott White and Associate Director of Athletics for Internal Operations Sage Fowler. With three classes now

inducted following the 2021 inaugural ceremony, the chapter roll now stands at 70 outstanding Mulerider scholar-athletes.

SAU President Dr. Trey Berry delivered a special address and was also present to lead a small graduation ceremony for 14 student-athletes who graduated in May, but were unable to attend the May 5-6 graduation dates due to participation in their respective conference tournaments. Max Dyson, '79, '82 briefly spoke on the Mulerider Club and of its impact, past, present, and future, on Mulerider Athletics after serving as the club chair this past year.

In 2018, through feedback from the SAU Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, two new award categories were established with the Male and Female Newcomer of the Year Awards, and the Male and Female Comeback Player of the Year Awards with both now being presented annually. Capturing the honors in the comeback category were Mulerider Women's Tennis junior Greta Wallin and Mulerider Men's Golf sophomore Logan McDonald. For the Newcomer of the Year award, SAU Women's Tennis freshman Annika Berrendorf and Mulerider Football junior Jacob Berry claimed the hardware.

SAU Awarded

ANCRC Grant



Southern Arkansas University receives ANCRC grant for renovation of Talley Hall and relocation and restoration of Mt. Prospect Church.

Southern Arkansas University has received its largest grant to date from the Arkansas Natural and Cultural Resources Council (ANCRC) to benefit two restoration projects: Talley Hall and Mt. Prospect Church. The grant amounts to a total of \$2.013 million.

“We treasure our partnership with ANCRC. What they have done for the SAU campus, and indeed the entire state, has been truly transformational,” said SAU President Dr. Trey Berry. “Once again, with the precious resources provided by the ANCRC, we will be able to preserve historic structures on the SAU campus that will benefit our students and educate future generations about our region’s unique history.”

The restoration of Talley Hall will ensure continued viability for future Muleriders. Beginning this summer, renovations to the bathrooms, reinforcement of the porch structure, and removal and replacement of the concrete porch and treads will be underway. In summer 2024, the approximately 120 single-pane windows in Talley’s rooms and walkways will be replaced with energy efficient, double-pane glass, completing the renovation.

Opened in 1964, Talley Hall is a co-ed “pod-style” dormitory with three three-story wings. It was named in honor of Milton B. Talley, a beloved Dean of Students, teacher of science, and Director of Student Employment. The 37,329 square foot residence hall boasts a modernistic design on the western side of campus with most of its 190 residents participating in the Agriculture Living Learning Community. On March 13, 2023, Talley, Talbot, and Greene Halls were added to the National Register of Historic Places, which made this grant possible.

Phase one of the Mt. Prospect project will include restoration as well as relocation from its existing location on Columbia County Road 66 to a prepared site adjacent to the Alexander House within the historic farmstead on Washington Street. Renovations include replacing the existing roof, windows, doors and steps; repairing beams, framing and siding; and connecting existing fencing and sidewalks. Phase one is scheduled to begin immediately with a completion date of summer 2024. Phase two will prioritize interior restoration.

Mt. Prospect Church was built in 1886 in the Greek Revival style and has remained virtually unchanged for over 100 years. It was added to the National Register of Historic Places on March 30, 1990.

Once relocated to the Alexander-Ozmer Historic Farmstead and Learning Center, the facility will be managed and maintained by the University. It will become part of a vibrant center that regularly hosts students, faculty/staff, and community members for events, meetings, and classes.



Despite his certifications to teach science, Chris Coker '98, '03, '21 never thought that he would teach chemistry. In fact, while working in housing for Southern Arkansas University and completing his masters in secondary education in the '90s, Coker received a call about an open teaching position:

“Camden Fairview called and said, ‘We heard you teach chemistry.’ And I said, ‘You heard wrong!’”

Luckily for Coker and the Camden Fairview School District, he accepted the position and hasn't looked back. More than two decades later, he has earned his principal licensure through SAU's educational leadership in administration and supervision program and is a College Board AP reader for chemistry, a T3 (Texas Instruments) regional instructor, and a finalist for the Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching.

According to the PAEMST website, the awards are “the highest honors bestowed by the United States government specifically for K-12 science, technology, engineering, and mathematics teaching.” Coker is one of seven Arkansas teachers selected as finalists.

“I didn't do it for me,” Coker said about the PAEMST application process. “There's a stigma of South Arkansas schools. I want our kids and parents to know that we have teachers who should be recognized. I want communities to be proud of what they have here.”

The high school football player from Cross Roads, Texas, and Longhorn fan (don't hold it against him), moved to Arkansas in 1991 after being recruited by SAU Coach John Rich. Coker was a wide receiver and tight end for the Muleriders for three years while taking science and education courses as well as obtaining his coaching endorsement.

Coker found a home away from home in Magnolia, forming friendships he maintains today. He pledged Sigma Tau Gamma and built a brotherhood with his football team. Under the former housing director Dean J Courson, Coker was hired as a resident assistant, a hall director, and ultimately promoted to area coordinator for men's housing. During this time, Coker met his wife, Kimberly, who obtained her masters in clinical and mental health counseling from SAU. Two of their four daughters, Isabella Curbelo and Kennedy Coker, also boast degrees from SAU.

Coker credits SAU with laying a strong foundation for his teaching as he continues to see the influence of former professors in his own classroom. For example, instructors Dr. Leo Carson Davis and Dr. Henry Robison from the biology department provided memorable hands-on experiences and field trips which reflected their dedication to teaching as well as a genuine interest in their students.

Dr. Connie Wilson, dean of the school of graduate studies, said, “Chris is an outstanding educator and leader, demonstrating great capacity for collaboration and encouraging others. Congratulations, Chris!”

Coker juggles a heavy teaching load of AP chemistry, AP physics, accelerated chemistry, and introduction to education. As a football coach, cross country coach, and head senior boys track coach, he's committed to supporting students outside of the classroom as well.

The PAEMST award “recognizes those teachers who have both deep content knowledge of the subjects they teach and the ability to motivate and enable students to be successful in those areas.” Coker's students graduate to excel in many areas, from local dentists and principals to Emmy-award winning meteorologists.

Chris and Kimberly live in Ouachita County and have nine grandchildren in Arkansas and Texas who they try to spend as much time with as possible.


